
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Ahead of Congressional Diversity in Tech Summit, Sen. Elizabeth Warren & Four House Members Join **Bipartisan HBCU Caucus**

WASHINGTON, DC- Ahead of the 2nd Annual Diversity in Tech Summit, the Congressional Bipartisan Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) Caucus announced the addition of five new Members from both the House and Senate. Senator Elizabeth Warren (D-MA) joined the Caucus, along with Reps. Cheri Bustos (D-IL), Andre Carson (D- IN), Sylvia Garcia (D- TX), and Lucy McBath (D-GA).

The Congressional Bipartisan HBCU Caucus was founded in 2015 by Rep. Alma S. Adams, Ph.D. (D-NC) and Rep. Bradly Byrne (R-AL). The Caucus promotes bipartisan legislation that supports HBCUs and their graduates. Since its inception, the Caucus has secured more than \$200 million in additional federal funding for HBCUs. In 2017, the Caucus launched its landmark HBCU Partnership Challenge that brings together government and industry leaders for quarterly conferences that help forge stronger, more sustainable HBCU and industry partnerships. Thirty-five companies have taken the Caucus' HBCU Partnership Challenge.

"Like many of my colleagues, I wouldn't be in Congress today if not for an HBCU. Despite being grossly underfunded and undervalued, these institutions continue to provide pathways of opportunity for people of color and many first-generation college students. HBCUs also contribute more than \$15 billion dollars annually to our national economy. These schools matter and every member of this body has a responsibility to help level the playing field for HBCUs and their students," said Congresswoman Adams. "I'm proud to welcome my colleagues to the Caucus. Together, we will continue working across the aisle and within both Chambers to ensure HBCU students have equal access to federal resources and 21st century career opportunities."
