#### State and Local Education Action Teams Join Forces Ahead of State Convention

The LWVCM and LWVNC Education Action Teams are collaborating on a presentation titled "Update on NC K-12 Education Issues Before the 2023 NC Legislature," for the upcoming State Convention. The State LAT will also introduce the formation of the "LWVNC Public Education Action Network" which aims to bring us all together with a strong, united, statewide LWV voice to advocate for public education and our local public schools. The presentation will be on May 20 from 11:15 AM – 12:00 PM. To register for the Convention, <u>click here</u>.

On May 21, a caucus will be held during breakfast to further discuss the development of the LWVNC Public Education Action Network. Network members from across the state will join together to increase our effectiveness in advocating for public education issues at the state level.

The goals of the Network are to: 1. develop a statewide LWV member network to advocate for NC public education issues focusing on the NC General Assembly and the Executive Branch (Governor, State Board of Education, Superintendent of Public Instruction) and 2. address the need for legislators and state officials to hear from constituents across the state. The aim of the network is to coordinate our advocacy efforts and learn from each other how state issues are impacting local school districts in both urban and rural communities. We propose that the Network members will select 2-3 policy focus areas per year, which are aligned with the proposed Public Education Position Statement. Members from all chapters and membersat-large are encouraged to join.



# LWVCM President's Perspective



This month, I am departing from my usual message by featuring an essay by a Michael H. the nephew of our Board Secretary, Pam Liebman. Michael is a Junior attending Western University in Bellingham, Washington considering a teaching career. Michael's essay focuses on the very timely topic of the history, origins and impact of the exploitation of fear as a means of control and manipulation. When questioned about what can be done to encourage young people to vote, Michael replied: "Make me see my vote counts." Pam relates that her brother is enjoying the dialogue resulting through his exchanges with his grandson about his essay.

It is important to recall what Edmund Burke, an 18th Century philosopher (also quoted in Michael's essay) said of fear: "No passion so effectively robs the mind of all its powers of acting and reasoning as fear." Unfortunately, we have witnessed Burke's observation play out in recent elections as some politicians have persuaded voters through fear tactics to favor a particular party or candidate. Studies have revealed that these messages exert almost two times the

effect as straightforward messaging. In addition, the use of fear to influence voters negatively effects voter turnout. These exploitive attempts to influence voting include conspiracy theories which we observe infiltrating our news on a daily basis.

What can we do to combat this scourge? The answer may lie in educating our citizens on the underlying psychology of fear. Hopefully, this will lead toward a more informed voting public, who is less vulnerable to lies and appeals to their most deep-seated fears.

#### An Essay on Fear by Michael H.

Fear can be one of the most powerful human emotions that drives us. Historically, fear has protected us from the dangers of the natural world; yet, as we emerge from the Industrial Revolution, those fears have largely been quenched by means of civilization. Fear, however, has not diminished. Today, many fears have come to fill that void. Sometimes these fears are of real threats; most of the time, however, they are imagined or imposed onto us by people in more powerful positions. 18th century philosopher Edmund Burke wrote, "When one is gripped by fear of a threat, real or imagined, their rational and higher cognitive functions shut down, making one easily manipulated by anyone that promises safety from the threat." Governments around the world have historically utilized fear as a means of controlling the masses. That is why I believe that in our global age, fear is the most powerful non-violent force elites can impose against a society. All our information comes from a narrative that certain people need to be upheld to maintain power. Whether it is Arab people as the antithesis of terror, or alternate ideologies like communism being condemned, our politicians want you to think a certain way.

#### ClubExpress Corner: Account Activation, Membership Renewal, and Volunteer Opportunities

We have been on ClubExpress as our member engagement platform since December. We know that for many, this platform and engaging with us in this way is new and can present some challenges as we shift to better serve you and our community. ClubExpress positions us to expand our messaging and present many exciting features to manage our League business. One of the exciting parts about ClubExpress is that event reminders and notifications are autogenerated. As a volunteer organization, having automated features like event reminders allows us to focus on what matters most, educating and informing our community.

ClubExpress will power our renewal process entirely online. When renewals begin this summer, renewal notifications will be sent directly to your inbox.

To prepare for the 2023 renewal process, we need to ensure that everyone has activated their account by accepting the member agreement. In December, all members were emailed their user name and temporary password. Many of you used that to login right away to set up your profile and select League areas of interest, but many did not. In the coming days, we will reset this function and the system will send out another notification with your user name and a new temporary password. If you have activated your account, you will NOT receive this email again. If you are a Lifetime Member, your membership expiration is 2050, but we still encourage you to activate your account. It is critical that you follow the prompts in the email and accept your member agreement. If you have questions once you receive the second attempt "welcome email," please contact ClubExpress Support directly. Their Help Team can assist you with any questions you may have about this process or any other account inquiries. We, LWVCM, do not have access to your password and cannot assist you directly.

As we work to build capacity in the League, we are looking for members who may be interested in joining the Communications team to serve as a co-Webmaster, learn more about our monthly newsletter (Voter), support social media, or join our strategy committee to offer a member's perspective. These are great opportunities for members who want to be active, yet need opportunities that can be done on their time, from any place as long as they have computer/phone access. There are extensive synchronous and asynchronous trainings, manuals, and virtual networking available via ClubExpress. No previous experience is necessary. ## March League Talk Gave Participants Much to Think About Ahead of the LWVNC Convention

On March 14, LWVCM League Members heard from Asheville-Buncombe County President and National Popular Vote Action Team Lead Dr. Suzanne Fisher. Fisher



walked attendees through how the current system is rife with controversy and has the potential to sow mistrust. The League has held the position that presidents should be elected by popular vote for more than 50 years. We intend to restate the position during our State Convention in May.

Those who are interested to hear more from Dr. Fisher can read the Op Ed she had published last week in the Citizen Times where she concludes "When we vote for every

other office, the candidate who gets the most votes wins. It should be the same for president. Remember, 'Your Vote is Your Voice'."

## **Backlash Follows Walgreens' Decision to Deny** Oral Abortion Medication Mifepristone Access

Women's Reproductive Rights undergo continual threats. The most recent is the decision by Walgreens, a major pharmaceutical chain, to deny customer's access to the oral abortion medication called Mifepristone (also known as RU 486) in at least twenty-one US states, not excluding states where the procedure is legal. The backlash against the decision has been strong and pervasive.

Senate Democrats along with fourteen state governors are pressuring Walgreens to grant access to the pill. Social media giants such as Twitter and TikTok are responding along with the other groups advocating for Walgreens to allow access to the medication. In addition, the stock market is reacting with Walgreens' stock suffering a 10% drop.

This route of medical abortion is chosen in more than half of the states in the country where surgical abortions are banned and it has become one of the residual options for those in areas with an absence of providers.


The movement to ban abortion in any form was successful in compelling Walgreens, but obviously will not stop with one company. Abortion opponents continue to target all large retail pharmacies and there is a likelihood that most, if not all, large pharmacy chains will submit to the demands.

#### Frances Perkins: Social Safety Net Superwoman

As we turn the page on this year's Women's History month, we pause to remember a pioneer in American activism and politics, Frances Perkins. Perkins advocated

for the safety and wellbeing of all people in her roles of chief investigator of a bipartisan commission formed improve worker safety in the aftermath of the Triangle Shirtwaist fire, New York State Industrial Commission appointee, and as the first female US Cabinet member when she became Secretary of Labor under President Franklin D. Roosevelt.
