Hurricane Helene Update

Dear friends,

First and foremost, I want to make sure you and your loved ones are safe and sound from Hurricane Helene, which devastated parts of North Carolina and covered our district with deadly rain and wind. My heart goes out to the residents in Western North Carolina and all those devastated in the storm's wake in the Carolinas, Georgia, Tennessee, and Florida and to the families of those who are missing or have lost their lives.

I spent yesterday morning on a briefing call with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), learning about resources available for our district to help those in need.

We won't know the true toll of this devastation for weeks to come, however, I know that everyone is working as swiftly as possible to restore power and communications to the area and to provide essential supplies. President Biden, Vice President Harris, and Governor Cooper have my full support to ensure that all federal resources are made available to assist our neighbors in need.



ASSISTANCE OPTIONS

FEMA

FEMA continues to strategically move resources to support life-saving and lifesustaining response needs including shipping meals, water, generators, tarps to the areas impacted by Helene. There are financial resources that can be made available to constituents once you register with the agency.

 Ahead of further disruptions, I urge you to <u>sign up for CharMeck Alerts</u> - register to receive location-specific emergency alerts.

Call 311 to help with cleanup for situations like:

- · Reporting storm drain blockages or creek blockages.
- Reporting water and wastewater emergencies.
- Reporting downed trees in yards that do not pose a safety risk (<u>you can also do</u>
 it online).
- For power outages, call your energy provider. For most of us, that's Duke Energy: 800.452.2777. Here is their outage map.

Rep. Adams In Live and Cosponsors Many Bills in September Session

Our three weeks in session came to a close on Wednesday, and I had a busy September. We held a hearing for the House Subcommittee on Higher Education and Workforce Development, part of the Education and Workforce Committee. During the hearing, I learned more about the delays in FAFSA processing for students that has left young people without the help they need to attend school. I also questioned Government Accountability Office representatives on what went wrong and how the Department of Education is working to fix the problem.



In the past four weeks, I also introduced or cosponsored five bills I want to share with you, because together they form the stool upon which we can step toward a fairer, more sustainable, and more equitable future.

1. The Parent PLUS Parity Act (H.R. 9753)

This bill, which I share with Senator Chris Van Hollen (D-MD) will help parents who've taken on unsustainable debt to put their children through college. Read more here.



2. The Industrial Agriculture Conversion Act (IACA) (H.R. 9794)

This legislation, introduced by Congressman Jim McGovern (MA-02), Senator Cory Booker (D-NJ), and myself, will ensure that small farmers can use existing federal funds to adjust from factory farming toward pasture-based sustainable agriculture. Read more here.

3. The College Thriving Act (H.R. 9824)

Introduced with my fellow North Carolina Democratic Congresswoman Valerie Foushee (NC-04), this legislation will support skills-for-success courses for freshman students, to help them adjust to college life, and would prioritize HBCUs. Read more here.

4. The Sickle Cell Disease Treatment Centers Act (H.R. 9872)

Some of you may know how the issue of Sickle Cell Disease is personal for me, having watched my sister Linda succumb to it at age 26. The doctors often couldn't do more than treat her pain.

This bill, which I am co-sponsoring with Senators Van Hollen and Booker, and Reps. Barbara Lee (CA-12) and Danny Davis (IL-07), will expand Sickel Cell Disease care services to community health and outpatient centers, allowing more victims to access care. Read more here.

5. The Uterine Cancer Study Act (H.R. 9782)

I joined my colleagues, Representatives Robin Kelly (IL-02), Shontel Brown (OH-11), Bonnie Watson Coleman (NJ-12), and Yvette Clarke (NY-09) to introduce legislation to study the connection between Uterine Cancer and hair-straightening products. We presented this bill outside the Capitol:



It's been a busy session for us despite efforts to delay passage of important legislation. My colleagues and I ensured that the Federal government remains which ensures that agencies have the funds they need now to support Americans reeling from last week's storm.

Lastly, I joined Senators Grassley, Merkley, Booker, and Rep. Hinson to introduce a resolution recognizing September 19th as **National Stillbirth Prevention Day** (H.Res. 1495). Earlier this year, President Biden signed my bipartisan **Stillbirth Prevention Act**, which will unlock resources to research, treat, and prevent stillbirth, which affects roughly 5000 American babies a year.

Emily Price and Jen Rowray of Healthy Birthday, Tina Sherman of MomsRising, and Kinika Harris, a DC resident who lost her child to stillbirth, joined me in my office to discuss our successful work to pass this legislation. They were kind enough to give me an award for my efforts, the Champion of Change Award.



Adams Hunger Initiative

I welcomed my third quarterly Adams Hunger Initiative to solve hunger the best way I know how, by cooking with friends at NourishUp.

We discussed how to make the most of everyday ingredients and fresh produce, and answered questions about family recipes passed down for generations.

Finally, we joined NourishUp to pack up boxes of food for donation – together we prepared 54 family boxes of food for donation – a year's worth of food for a single family of four. I'm thankful to my staff and our hunger partners who participated in the effort.


